## POTOMAC REGION LAUNCHES 2025 AUTOCROSS SEASON

### WITH BACK-TO-BACK EVENTS AT SUMMIT POINT

The Potomac Region kicked off the 2025 Autocross season in style with a weekend doubleheader at Summit Point on March 15–16. The action began with an autocross school on Saturday, followed by the season's first official competition on Sunday.

Saturday's school drew 33 enthusiastic students, guided by 12 experienced coaches and supported by eight dedicated volunteers. The day opened with focused driving exercises—throttle steering, trail braking, and slalom drills—designed to teach essential car control techniques. In the afternoon, students combined those skills on a full autocross course.

putting their knowledge to the test across seven timed runs. Sunshine and ideal weather made for a perfect day to sharpen reflexes and build confidence behind the wheel.

Sunday brought more challenging conditions. Sixty-six drivers lined up to compete in the season opener, braving intermittent rain and slick pavement. The first two heats contended with the wet surface, but a dry spell during Heat 3 brought lap times down dramatically as the wind cleared moisture from the course. Drivers in the S5 class took full advantage, claiming five of the top six overall positions and establishing themselves as the group to watch this season.

### MORE MARCH EVENTS AT SUMMIT POINT

The PCA Potomac's Drivers' Education season's excellent start continued into the end of March.

Potomac's High Performance Drivers Clinic (HPDC) event for beginners took place the first week of March to set the stage for two High Performance Driving Events (HPDE) with participants at all driving levels on March 21st—23rd. See the previous edition of DV for details on the HPDC.

We will pick up some details on the HPDE events here.

The weekend venue was Summit Point Motorsport Park in West Virginia. All weekend sessions took place at our favorite track, the challenging two-mile-long Summit Point Main Circuit.

The Friday National Instructor Training and Solo Day was dedicated to current Potomac Instructors, Instructor Mentors, Instructor Candidates, and advanced solo drivers. No students participated on Friday, so the instructors could have plenty of time to focus on their skills training.

The Potomac Instructor Development team (headed by Ron Tilton and Henrik Ojikutu) delivered a challenging and interactive program with guidance, personnel, and documentation support from PCA National DE Program. The team included many Potomac trainers, such as mentors, curriculum instructors, and presenters. The comprehensive National Instructor Training Program aimed at the Instructor Candidates included both on-track and classroom learning modules with evaluations.

This very successful day provided Potomac with five fully National Certified Instructors and about a dozen newer candidates with a timeline and path to certification.

Also, on Friday, we held a Solo Day, allowing advanced drivers, instructors, and non-instructors to have many run sessions in a very low-key driving format, focusing on improving and developing driving skills and safety.

Let us move on to the Saturday and Sunday events of the weekend, Potomac's First DE of 2025.

The DE provided our familiar Drivers Education format with 5 Run Groups supporting beginners to experts. The groups included Beginners with an instructor (Green), Novices with an instructor (Blue), Intermediates with no required

instructor (White), Advanced students and instructors (Black), and Most Advanced students and instructors (Red).

The Weekend included 98 smiling drivers, instructors, and new instructors on Friday and 166 on Saturday and Sunday, including many happy students.

# TWELVE HOURS OF SEBRING

### PORSCHE PENSKE MOTORSPORT GOES 1-2 IN GTP WHILE AO RACING'S PORSCHE 911 GT3R WINS GTD PRO!

After relatively little winter driving of our 2024 992.1 GTS, the 12-15 March Sebring, Florida, race weekend was a perfect road trip. The weather was perfect for the long Jacksonville drive in heavy traffic on I-95. The driver aids technology adapted from motorsport was quite useful; the Porsche Inno Drive and its supporting systems, such as the 3D Surround View, revealed potential hazards. The Front Axle Lift System proved essential at every "pit stop".

The following day, I visited the Brumos Collection in Jacksonville, a must-visit for any Porsche enthusiast. The museum features a brass car section, including early Peter Gregg and Hurley Haywood 914s and 911s, as well as various 908s, 911s, 917s, 962s, Riley DPis, a couple of Porsche transporters, and the Brumos homage 2019 Sebring Grand Touring Le Mans (GTLM RSR) class winner. A large shop in

the back of the museum houses the Collection's restorations and maintenance facility. After that wonderful morning of history, it was on to Sebring.

It was great to switch to Sport Mode on the back roads around the track. We arrived in time for the first Porsche Carrera Cup support race, the International Motorsports Association (IMSA) Michelin Pilot Challenge (MPC) qualifying, and the WeatherTech SportsCar Championship (WSC) day and night practices. I checked in at the. As always, Porsche Cars North America (PCNA) representatives and the dedicated Porsche Club of America (PCA) volunteers were busy preparing the PorschePlatz located at the exit of Sunset Bend. After night practice, the Porsche Night Vision Assist was welcome for my foggy drive back to the hotel.

Friday morning started at 10:20 with a 45-minute Mustang Challenge race, followed by twenty-five-minute qualifying sessions for each of the four WSC classes. The Michelin Pilot Challenge 120 Race, the 250th race of the Grand Sport (GS) class, began at 14:15, with an Aston Martin and the Jeff Westphal / Sean McAlister #39 CarBahn with Peregrine Racing BMW M4 GT4 EVO on the front row, and the #28 RS1 Porsche 718 GT4 RS CS driven by Luca Mars and Jan Heylen in third position. The race was tight between the Porsche, the CarBahn BMW and Daniel Morad's #57 Winward Racing Mercedes-AMG GT GT4. With 47 minutes remaining, they made their final pit stops, with Westfall's BMW exiting with a narrow lead over Halen's Cayman. Once in front, Westphal was able to build a gap over Heylen, who had the Winward Mercedes on his tail. However, in the final 10 minutes, the Mercedes suffered a puncture in its right front tire, dropping it from contention. Westphal achieved a commanding 16-second victory over the #28 Porsche. Dillon Machavern and Francis Selldorff took third place in the #95 Turner Motorsport BMW.

At the PorschePlatz, Volker Holzmeyer, President and CEO of Porsche Motorsports North America, explained how motorsport directly improves the entire Porsche product line. A driver question-and-answer session followed. Artist Steve Petrosky's latest print commemorates Nick Tandy's record-breaking four 24-hour wins and the #7's victory at the 2025 Daytona 24 Hours. Nick was humble in his remarks and effusive in his praise for his teammates, and was kind enough to autograph my print. Later, at the driver autograph session at the team garage, his driver teammates also signed. In the evening, I made my pilgrimage to the Inn On the Lake for supper, and later stopped by at Chicanes Restaurant and Bar. The walls are covered with wonderful art and sepia photographs of the previous winners and racing since 1952. Drivers and racing personalities also frequent it.

Saturday's activities started before dawn in some paddock garages—others had never slept—and many spectator Porsches made their way to the track for parade laps. I arrived at PorschePlatz early for Cars and Coffee. PCA volunteers lined us up by car category, and we received our parade safety briefing from IMSA's Diezel Lodder. Those of you who have raced here know you have to "Love the Bumps." At 08:00 sharp, we headed onto the track for three laps to imagine what the sensation must be at three times our speed!

After the usual PCA raffles and quizzes, I headed for the grid walk before the race. The weather was magnificent. At the massive Porsche Penske pit stall, I wished Felipe Nasr a good race. After the pit lane was cleared and the field completed warm-up laps, the 73rd annual 12 Hours started at 10:10. The grid had Dries Vanthoor in a BMW on pole with Tom Blomqvist in an Acura completing. Felipe Nasr and Mathieu Jaminet in Penske Porsche 963s were next, with Neal Jani's Proton 963 and Renger Van der Zande's Acura on the third row. After watching a few laps, I walked the track starting at turn 6, but unfortunately, my ID Card did not give me access to the newly renovated Hendricks Field "Officers' Club" hospitality venue.

Dries Vanthoor took an immediate lead but was penalized for switching lanes before the start line. A fight then developed between the Cadillacs and Porsches, with #7 in third and #6 in fourth after eight hours. The Aston Martin Valkyrie V12 non-hybrid made an impressive debut with a sound unlike any other. The LMP2 (Pro-Am teams) were, as usual, highly competitive. In GTD Pro, the top teams were the Ferraris, BMW, and the AO Porsche. The goal was to be patient, stay clean and on the lead lap during the first ten hot hours, and save some "sticker slicks" for the final pit stop and the cool of the evening.


From the Officers' Club, I headed clockwise to the Hairpin (7), then Fangio (8, 9), "Infamous" Turn 10, Collier (11,12), Tower (13), Flying Fortress Straight and Bishop (14) to observe Le Mans (15). I then crossed over to Big Bend (5, 6) before going to Turn 1. I went back out to view Ullman Straight from the new grandstands outside of Sunset Bend (17) and watched the sun sink. The drivers who "love the bumps" while taking care of their cars, win. There was fantastic action, with just a 12-second difference between the fastest laps of the Grand Touring Prototype (GTP) winner and the Grand Touring Daytona winner, Philip Ellis's #57 Mercedes-AMG GT3, and only nine full-course cautions and green for the final one hour and 13 minutes.

Porsche Penske Motorsport capped its decisive victory in the Rolex 24 at Daytona. Nick Tandy added this win at Sebring to his Tandy Slam record-breaking collection of four global 24-hour wins at Daytona, Le Mans, Spa and the Nürburgring, plus Petit Le Mans—putting him in very rare company with the likes of Foyt, Herrmann, Oliver, Holbert, Haywood, Baldi, Wallace, Werner and Bernhard.

Porsche Penske Motorsport aims to win every race, but this year, the priority is to secure Roger's first Le Mans victory, and Porsche's 20th. Porsche is also preparing its customer teams, Proton Competition and JDC Miller, to take over the IMSA and World Endurance Championship (WEC) efforts. Both teams are making steady progress, as demonstrated by their 6th and 8th place GTP finishes at Sebring. The next IMSA challenge for the team will be a very different "sprint race" on the streets of Long Beach on 12 April. In WEC, next is the 6 Hours of Imola on 20 April.

On Sunday, we headed north for a lovely visit with friends in Myrtle Beach. At the Florida-South Carolina line, we were met with a torrential downpour; the 911 system, in "Wet Mode," handled it superbly. From there, I took some local roads to rejoin I-95 North. It was a great road trip, complete with plenty of Porsches, car talk, racing, and catching up with friends. The next race for us will be the Sahlen's Six Hours at the Glen in June.

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

# LEW AZZINARO LIFE IN FULL COLOR

If you're one of the more socially active members of the Potomac Porsche Club, chances are you've already met one of our most outgoing and gregarious members: Lew Azzinaro. As his wife Barbara often says, "Lew isn't just an extrovert—he's a pathological extrovert!"


Lew and Barbara joined the club in 2005 and became more active in social events around 2007. Their Porsche journey began in 1999 with a used 911 Carrera Cabriolet—manual, of course. Today, they own two of Stuttgart's finest: a manual 2015 911 Carrera S coupe and a 2019 Cayenne Turbo.

Social butterflies by nature (especially Lew), they've been enthusiastic participants in nearly every club event—Drive & Dines, concours gatherings, monthly brunches, and more. Lew, in particular, shines when welcoming new members. With his laid-back, hippie charm and boundless energy, he's the guy chatting up everyone in the room—and somehow still talking about Porsches every now and then.

A lifelong artist, Lew discovered his talent early. At just six years old, the nuns at his Catholic school noted on a report card: "Lew is always disruptive, very distracted, and causes trouble—but he does seem to have an above-average ability in art. We just wish he'd apply some of that talent to other subjects." That lukewarm praise sparked a lifelong creative journey.


Despite struggling academically, Lew's artistic abilities carried him forward. With help from his high school art teacher, Carroll Ayotte, he was accepted to St. Mary's College of Maryland—something Lew still considers lifechanging. He went on to earn a BFA in Illustration from the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA) in 1978. But the real highlight of college, Lew says, was meeting Barbara. They married in 1981 and raised two daughters, Rachel and Sarah, in Reston, Virginia.

After graduating, Lew launched a successful career in illustration. He spent three years in advertising and graphic design before going freelance for 25 years. His client list included Mobil Oil, The Washington Post, The New York Times, National Geographic, Disney, Marriott, the Baltimore Orioles, United Airlines, and many more. At one point, Lew had art agents nationwide helping him land work from coast to coast.



He retired in 2005, shifting gears to work part-time with Barbara, who built a thriving career as a manufacturer's rep in the contract design industry. She represents some of the country's top furnishings lines, serving major hotels, hospitality companies, and design studios across the Mid-Atlantic.

So, where did Lew's Porsche obsession begin? Naturally, it traces back to a poster of Janis Joplin draped across the hood of her wildly painted Porsche 356. It hung on his teenage bedroom wall, and he fell in love—with both Janis and that iconic car.

In retirement, Lew began painting friends' cars, starting with a watercolor of Michael and Mary Handelman's 997 Carrera Cabriolet. That thoughtful gift sparked a new creative outlet: Lew Azzinaro Car Art, founded in 2019. Since then, Lew has painted dozens of Porsches (and other marques), all in his signature watercolor-over-pencil style. Most pieces are around 11x14 inches and meticulously detailed.

Lew generously donates artwork to benefit causes dear to him and Barbara. He regularly contributes to the Erin Levitas

Foundation's annual auction, offering custom car portraits for winning bidders. They're also deeply involved with the American Heart Association in memory of their son David Benjamin Azzinaro, who passed away at three months old due to a congenital heart defect. Since 2020, Lew has donated one of his car portraits each year to raise funds for heart disease research.

Ask anyone who knows him, and they'll tell you—Lew brings warmth, humor, and soul to everything he does. That includes his art. One of his former art directors once summed him up perfectly: "Lew's kind of a scallywag and a scoundrel—but he's also one of the most talented illustrators we've ever worked with. And he never misses a deadline."

Lew takes great pride in that backhanded compliment.


