

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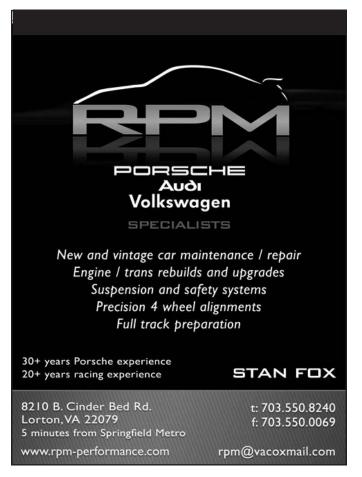
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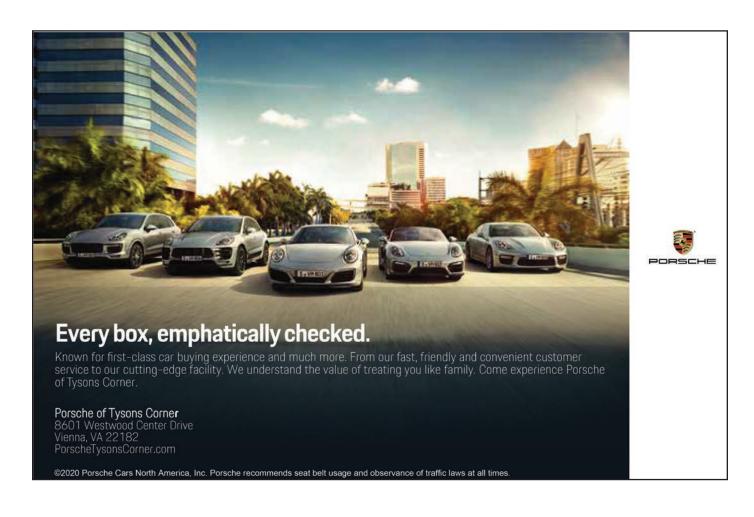

The Sunday Drive to Old House Vineyards

My father owned a flat six...but not from Germany. It was a Chevy. Yes, a Chevy Corvair with an air-cooled flat six. Creating the drive to the Old House Vineyard brought back a flood of memories from when I was much, much younger, sitting in the rear vinyl seat of the white over red Monza coupe with my four brothers. My family would take off after Sunday services to explore the southern countryside (clay dirt roads and all) on our way home. This was way before the internet, and maps could not identify all the small farm roads and ways to get from one place to another. Yet, we would take off with the windows down, in the sweltering Georgia summer heat, pulling our legs off the vinyl gingerly so we would not rip our skin off, to discover that countryside.

This vignette inspired the ride to Old House Vineyard that Rhonda and I created for the 19 cars that joined in a twohour inspired Sunday morning drive in mid-August through the hills and farm country of Prince William, Fauquier, Rappahannock, and Culpeper Counties in Virginia. The starting point was in Haymarket, and the two groups were off using wooded and scenic roads-less-traveled slammed full of twists, blind corners, and hills. The scenery was as amazing as the roadways, not that the drivers had a lot of time to take it all in. Surely, the navigators in each vehicle were able to glance up and catch a glimpse or two of the pastures, vineyards, old homesteads, and manors that we passed along the way.

What does it take to share childhood memories with a great group of Porsche enthusiasts? Not even including identifying a dining establishment that would satisfy the appetites of 36 who would have just spent the last two hours on the roadways, Rhonda will vouch for countless hours more spent reviewing electronic maps for roadways that may not have been traveled frequently by recent tours; then, when a route looked promising, taking more time identifying a convenient break

area for everyone to stretch legs and discuss their favorite section of the roadways before getting back in the Porsches to discover more. I think Rhonda and I traveled through the countryside more than five time over the weekends leading up to the tour. We discovered roads we had not traveled — and some that we would not even let our discovery vehicle, a BMW M235xi, traverse. All this was in the name of creating the ultimate Sunday drive for the experience of those who wanted to share it. It was sometimes an exercise in futility, as some of the best routes during our exploration ended on gravel roads; so we would strike them from the list and go back to the drawing board. That happened more than three times. But in the end, the Porsches, drivers, and navigators were ready to enjoy some feel-good food while discussing their adventure.

The Old House Vineyard was a great "find" itself. Rhonda and I were looking for a good venue that was historic, capable of accommodating our group, and provided a great lunch by a fantastic culinary. Where else can you find a winery, brewery and distillery with a World War II museum, Bavarian-style beer hall, and an authentic Irish pub that includes a model of the Titanic and baskets on the ceiling? Ryan, the operations manager, ensured that our club members were welcomed at the facility. He even took the group picture with Rhonda's

Our PorscheFest DE was the largest attraction of the weekend. This year's PorscheFest DE drew more than 180 participants and dedicated volunteers. All five run groups, including drivers from Novice (Green) through most advanced (Red) were at or near capacity. Everyone had lots of safe and fun driving during the weekend combined with in-car and inclassroom instruction, resulting in seven drivers being promoted from Green to Blue run groups, three from Blue group to White, three from White group to Black, and two more promoted from Black to Red group. Event participation

included drivers from nine other PCA Regions in addition to Potomac. Guest regions at PorscheFest included First Settlers, Chesapeake, Riesentöter, Shenandoah, Northern New Jersey, Michigan, Northeast and Metro New York! (Phew!)

A new addition to our DE event was our inaugural "Track Experience." This popular activity was newly developed by PCA National, and Potomac was eager to offer it at the Porsche Fest weekend. During a Green group session, the preregistered Track Experience participants went for a ride-along with one of three designated Experienced Instructors' cars.

We had a great turnout and intend to bring this feature into future Potomac DE events.

As usual, we would like to thank everyone who volunteered time and effort to make this event happen, especially those who put in extra work to make our Saturday of PorscheFest such a success. The fun would have been impossible without our generous volunteer crews. **W**

Porsche Tractors, Of Course!

An often overlooked but important aspect of Porsche's history, and its very survival as a viable company in the postwar era, is its production of tractors. Potomacans Peter Simon and Sal Fanelli shared their enthusiasm for their vintage diesel engine tractors at PorscheFest. Here's their takes:

Peter: Sal and I met when we both worked for a world-renowned small arms manufacturing company (Heckler & Koch) based in Southern Germany in the early 2000s. As Porsche car owners — and with Sal already a Porsche tractor owner — we were given a lead to a Porsche tractor for sale in Schonach, near Lake Constance (or Bodensee) by one of the senior executives of our employer in 2004. On a lark, we decided to check it out in conjunction with our next supervisory board meeting visit to the factory. I had no idea what I was looking at except for determining that the tractor was an Allgaier Porsche AP 17, actually ran, and was in pretty

bad visual shape: colors were red, rust, orange, and green in various places and layers. Nevertheless, I decided to buy it, and after keeping it in storage at the German factory for a few years, put it into a 20-foot shipping container and finally brought it home in 2007. I then bought a tow-behind mower and cut the grass on our five-acre property for several years.

It stopped working around 2015, and I brought it to Sal for restoration — where it sat from 2017 to 2022-23 waiting for me to start writing checks and helping with the work. Once we started the restoration, there were a couple of fits and starts over the challenges of finding a few unique and hard-to-find parts: injector pump rebuilds/restorations, and perfect matching paint and powder coating. Once sourced and refurbished, work progressed relatively quickly, and we finished the restoration a couple of weeks before PorscheFest — with all credit going to Sal and his incredible technical and mechanical expertise.



An often overlooked but important aspect of Porsche's history, and its very survival as a viable company in the post-war era, is its production of tractors.



Amateur historical research conducted over the intervening years has resulted in the discovery that this Allgaier Porsche 17 (AP 17) — with Serial Number 11744 and its 1986-dated Kraftfahrzeugbrief (German title/registration document) as provided by the Seller to me listing January 31, 1951, as the first registration date — is very likely a tractor manufactured in 1950, the first year of AP 17 production. One German Porsche tractor literature source states that initial production serial numbers ranged from 1100 to 2100 (approximately) and then 11000 on; if correct, this could be one of the first 1,800 Porsche tractors ever produced, and it is the only AP 17 we have ever seen in person.

Sal: As for mine, it's a late production 1962 sold in 1963. It was imported by the West Coast operation of the American Porsche-Diesel Company. The original owner hardly used the

tractor and mostly stored it in a barn. I found it in 2020 and brought it back to the East Coast. The in-depth restoration was started with the help of fellow PCA member Steve MacKellar and completed a few days before this year's PorscheFest. The tractor has all the original OEM parts except for a few upgrades to the electrical system.

When the American Porsche-Diesel Company was closed in 1970, all the OEM parts were stored in a facility in Pennsylvania. Those parts were purchased in 2013 and the original company reopened its doors. The American Porsche-Diesel Company is now selling OEM parts and servicing and restoring tractors for its customers. **DV**

It's a Family Affair: Mothers and Sons on the Track

Editor's Note: In the Porsche Club of America and its regional clubs, it's not uncommon to find families sharing a love of racing or winding country roads. It might be more rare to find mothers and sons sharing a passion for driving fast, but it's not impossible. Kathryn Turner and Carolyn Hill-Fotoubi, two dedicated mothers, have not only passed down their enthusiasm for driving to their sons, KJ and Pars, but have also forged unique bonds through their shared experiences on and off the racetrack. From the twisting roads of Virginia to the bustling paddocks of PorscheFest, these mother-son duos are a testament to how a love for Porsche can create lifelong connections. Kathryn and Carolyn met at a PCA HPDE event more than a decade ago and both have been PCA Potomac members for more than twenty years.

Kathryn Turner and her son, KJ

In the 1950s, I grew up in what was at that time rural Virginia. As a teenager in the 1960s, my boyfriend (later my husband) and his friends drove the original muscle cars. I thought they were great until a small, boxy BMW 2002i blew past us on a

curvy road like we were standing still. I started to read up on European sports cars and their wonderful four-cylinder engines. I was hooked. I regularly devoured Road & Track and Car and Driver.

I decided that my dream car had to be a Porsche. To me, it was the epitome of form, fit and function, but they were certainly out of my league. I continued to read car magazines throughout college, and for as long as I had time, until work and motherhood demanded all my attention.

Growing up, my son, KJ, didn't know about my love of 'The Automobile.' All he knew was that I expected him to do his homework, clean up his room, and respect his curfew. Then, one Sunday morning, I found him watching an FI race. We finally had a 'Fun Zone' and began our journey with cars.

In 2000, he invited me to go with him to test drive the new Audi TT. After a spin, the TT wasn't KJ's dream car, but a '99 Carrera on the showroom floor caught my eye. I arranged a test drive and discovered that the thrill of driving a Porsche 911 was even better than I imagined.

A few weeks later, I ordered the car of my dreams. I named her 'Gravie,' because, after checking off many of my life's goals, she represented that the rest of my life would be gravy. KJ suggested I enroll in a high performance driving course. I was hooked. Next came my first HPDE at Virginia International Raceway in the fall of 2001. By that time I had also picked up a 996 Turbo, so KJ and I shared my two 911s and set off on our Porsche journey.

KJ quickly progressed to Red, becoming an instructor, and getting certified to Club Race. KJ became my off-track and on-track coach along with other wonderful HPDE instructors. He gave me books to read and videos to watch and tested me to see if I had studied. Thanks to him, I progressed to White.

Carolyn Hill-Fotouhi and her son, Pars

Like Kathryn, my love of cars began as a child. In my case, it was in rural North Carolina—the heart of NASCAR country. As a teenager, my dream car was a Pontiac Trans Am, but I had to drive the family sedan — a retired police cruiser that my dad bought at auction.

My fiance, Nader, helped me shop for my first new car, which I purchased a few weeks before our wedding. It was a sporty, give-me-a-ticket-red Mazda MX-6 with a standard transmission. With great patience, Nader taught me how to drive a manual. We both loved that car.

After fifteen years of marriage and well into our careers, Nader wanted to race Porsches. He purchased a used 944 for \$10,000 and started with autocross events. He moved to HPDEs and ultimately to racing.

I went with Nader to one HPDE event, but hanging out in the heat while chasing our 4-year-old, Pars, around a paddock of moving cars was not my idea of a good time. I decided to become a participant and started taking part in HPDEs, too.

In 2007, I bought my first Porsche, a '93 964 in Wimbledon Green Metallic, and by the time Pars was learning to drive, Nader and I had become HPDE instructors and Teen Street Survival coaches. Imagine driving on your permit with your

Carolyn Hill-Fotouhi: My reaction to my student assignment was exactly like Kathryn's. Surprised and delighted to ride with her and doubly amazed and thrilled that KJ would be riding with Pars. Plus, we'd all be in the Blue Run Group and could keep an eye on each other. What a coincidence. This definitely was in keeping with this year's family theme. We're always looking for others to join the ranks of mother-son driving duo. **N**

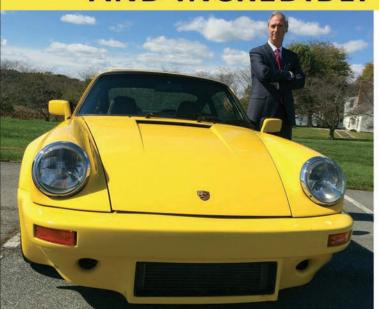


