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



Oktobercross

Halloween, 2021 Washington Circuit, Summit Point, WV

Can you think of any time you felt uncomfortable in a car? Maybe you hit a puddle deeper than expected and started hydroplaning. Maybe you had a moment you gripped the steering wheel tighter when someone pulled out in front of you. Think of all the times you suddenly sucked in your breath and hoped you came out in one piece and now PCA Potomac has a way to help put you back in control: Autocross.

We ran the first half of our Oktobercross event in wet, misty conditions. For the first heat of drivers, that meant standing



puddles in many parts of the course. Prime conditions to hydroplane. If you had your wheels turned when that happened, you just kept going straight: what's known as "understeer." If you stepped on the gas just a bit too much in some areas, your rear would come right around: what's known as "oversteer."

What you just read might alarm you. You might be terrified of the thought of spinning, even on a closed course like Autocross. Yet on the Autocross course, you can have a coach

with you. Someone who's spun plenty of times in their car, figuring out what makes it spin, and more importantly, what brings it back when you start to spin. The top Autocross drivers drive a very narrow line between keeping all four tires going in the direction they want and the car spinning out. As Mario Andretti once said, "If everything seems under control, you're not going fast enough."

If you're someone on the fence about whether to try Autocross and thinks, "I have no intention of trying to be that competitive," you don't need to. We class all Porsches based on similar power and handling characteristics. That means you can be competitive if you want, but many of our participants come to Autocross to learn more about what their car can do. I promise you it can do leagues more than you may think.

If you just got a new, or new to you Porsche model, and don't know who to ask to learn more about the car, you should come out to an Autocross. It's almost a guarantee someone who's been driving Autocross for years will probably have driven the model you now own, and can tell you more than you ever thought possible. Even better, most of those folks are also coaches and can give you a more nuanced feel from the passenger seat as you put it through its paces.

PCA has always been about the people. Our Potomac chapter of Autocrossers live up to that promise in spades. We had a bevy of costumes on parade at our Oktobercross, from a James Dean costume (with accompanying "Lil Bastard" decals on the car), to a bumblebee, and some sort of Elvis/70's disco hybrid. Autocross veterans and coaches helped newcomers with their tire pressure (it matters more than you think), we gorged ourselves on catered breakfast and lunch, and even had one of our Autocross chairs, Bill Conley, in the Halloween spirit at Finish with a werewolf mask and a bucket of candy.

A bunch of people living their best lives with their Porsches, costumes, and challenging conditions that helped everyone learn something new about their car...what more could you ask for during an Oktobercross event? **DV**



Third place: Matt and Hayley DeHart with a score of 15 out of 16 possible points.


Second place: Mikael and Liesel Tavener, also with 15 points but edged out third place through a random throw of the dice.



As long as I can remember, I've loved cars. Growing up, I wanted to be a race car driver, a delivery driver, even a taxi driver, anything to get behind the wheel. The first Porsche I rode in was a friend's dad's 911 when I was about 8. I had no idea at the time that later in life that marque would come to fill so many key components of my life.

Fast forward to 2016 and my husband (Sean) and I had recently moved to Herndon, VA from the Boston area. I had accepted a job at a science consulting firm where I would be leading data analysis research projects in my specialty area of aviation weather. A coworker friend of mine and longtime PCA Potomac member, Ed Hahn, told us about the High Performance Driving Event (HPDE) program and encouraged us to give it a try. Sean and I had been regulars at the quarter-mile drag strip for years, starting in Indiana where we met, but HPDE was a new concept to me.

Our garage had always contained GM vehicles so it was logical that we decided to try our new Corvette Z06 on this HPDE thing. I soon found myself at the Summit Point Jefferson Circuit on a chilly and rainy March morning for a PCA Potomac High Performance Driving Clinic (HPDC). To say I was nervous is an understatement. Sliding around on the skid pad? Driving on track with other cars? Yikes! But by the end of the day, I was hooked. Not just on the exhilaration and challenge of driving, but by the camaraderie and welcome I felt from everyone at the event.



Buoyed by all the fun I had at the HPDC, I signed up for all the remaining HPDE events at Summit Point Raceway Main circuit that year. I was pleasantly surprised to find that I wasn't the only non-Porsche in the paddock at these events, and even happier that everyone welcomed me even being behind the wheel of a Corvette.

I was hooked. I loved the mental challenge and focus, the adrenaline rush, sharing smiles and laughs in the paddock after each day of the event with our friends who quickly became our track family, and diving into data and video from my sessions to identify areas to focus on for improving my driving technique. Sean and I attended just about every HPDE event from that point on and after a couple of years, we found ourselves on the verge of becoming instructors and felt the pull of Porsche ownership.

So in March of 2018, we purchased our first Porsche – a black 2014 (981) Cayman S - and after years of participating in HPDE events, finally became official PCA Potomac members! We brought it to an HPDE event at Virginia International Raceway (VIR) mere days after bringing it

home and fell in love with its nimble mid-engine handling. Finding ourselves without any vinyl (for car numbers) that would work on a black car, our friends Pat and Michael Kaunitz came to our rescue and said they would bring some vinyl for us. Little did we know that vinyl would be disco ball silver, and before we knew it the car had its nickname – "Sparkles".

Not long after getting Sparkles, we became HPDE instructors. I have always enjoyed teaching (at the time most recently as a teaching assistant in graduate school), so I was very excited to start this new chapter of high performance driving. I quickly realized that HPDE instructing is just as much about connecting with a student's "learning language" as it is about sharing driving techniques, if not more so.

Following the theme of 2018, 2021 was also an actionpacked and incredibly fun year for us and for Sparkles. First off, I was given the incredible opportunity to also become



a classroom instructor. I had some big shoes to fill stepping in as the Green (novice) group classroom instructor after John Vrankovich, but teaching and delivering technical concepts to a broad audience was a familiar and enjoyable activity after years of giving engaging technical briefings to clients and at conferences for work. I dove in and spent hours developing a customized curriculum for each event, focusing on interactive exercises and on-track videos. Watching "light bulbs" go off as the students learned from each other and connected concepts made every minute I spent on preparation 100% worth it.

In parallel to becoming a classroom instructor, Sean and I decided to embark on PCA Club Racing and to turn our street "Sparkles" into a race car. After dropping the car off at SSI Motorsports in late 2020, it returned to us in early 2021 having pretty much only the shifter and headlights in common with its former street self. We planned to only do the Summit Point Club Race in September 2021, where I had volunteered as Grid Marshal for the previous 3 years, but there was so much to prepare! We needed racing suits, a radio for the car, class stickers, and the list seemed to be endless. But after a hectic summer and help from our track family, we had ourselves and Sparkles ready to race.



The car would be in GTB1 class, though we would have to double stint (or drive the car back-to-back) the Friday of the event for both of us qualify for our rookie licenses (with me running in GTB1-EX, or exhibition, in a different session). After officially becoming rookies at the end of Friday, Sean raced in the Saturday Sprint races and I raced the full enduro (90 minutes) on Sunday. We had an absolute blast and I can't wait to continue racing in 2022.

The third part of 2021 that was incredibly special to me was helping lead the inaugural Women's HPDC in October. Bolstering female participation in Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) has long been a passion of mine, a passion that quickly extended to high performance driving. The event was a remarkable success, evidenced by a paddock full of smiles and excitement about continuing their driving journeys.



I'm proud to say I am a woman who is a member of PCA Potomac; a club that values and includes all its members to make meaningful events for them. 
