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



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

# CONCOURS CREEK'S EDGE WINERY



you've been building up, or that \$1000 Ceramic coating you had applied? Wipers working properly?







# A BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO ATTENDING THE 24 HOURS OF LE NAANS

### **ATTENDING THE EVENT**

Combining Father's Day and a milestone birthday, my son and I travelled to France to attend the 93rd running of the 24 Hours of Le Mans. We decided to attend the event as individual spectators instead of in a group excursion to make our own choices among the various track events. We also wanted to experience the entire race week, rather than just the race itself, to see the teams' preparations for the race.

Due to our travel schedule, we missed the scrutineering and initial practice session, arriving at the track the Tuesday before the event. The only way I can describe the first impression is a mixture of excitement and awe. The size of the venue, with its many grandstands and other facilities, is immense, and we were only seeing the front straight! As the Tuesday before the race is the Pit Walk/Pit Challenge event, we immediately joined those. I highly recommend choosing these tickets to meet the team members, see the cars up close, and stand on the starting grid, imagining what it must be like to start the race with the Dunlop Curves ahead of you.

What was surprising was the length of the pit row -775 feet, or over 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  football fields – compared to the size of an individual pit box – about a one-car garage. For those readers fortunate enough to have a collection of Porsches, imagine having 62 race-ready cars to choose from. And did you know you can sign the start/finish line?

Wednesday and Thursday of race week combine free practice sessions and qualifying events. This is when one truly experiences the speed, power, and agility of the cars, especially the Hypercar class. And due to the historic nature of the track, unlike FI's design requirements, one can stand within 15-20 yards of the track. Talk about really feeling the speed of these racers as they navigate the turns!

Another advantage of attending these initial events is the opportunity to witness a lot of pit action. We decided to purchase grandstand seats and thus were directly across from the paddock. Seeing the cars come in and out for quick adjustments or driver changes was a plus. Another plus was watching the pits at the beginning of each qualifying session. It's a mini-race; all the qualifying classes wait in their pit spaces with their engines running. Then at the same moment, they race to line up at the pit exit. The sound of 40+ cars moving at once is something not to miss.

On race day, the atmosphere of the venue is both magical and magnetic. The best way I can describe the event is it is a world-class event with a state fair attached. The majority of the crowd are seated in folding chairs surrounding the track. The immense 8.3 mile track is carved through private lands, including farms, so you can only watch the race from some portions. It's worthwhile to see the race from different vantage points — we chose the front straight, the Dunlop Curves, and Tertre Rouge as our viewing locations. The pinnacle of the race, though, was the finale. It's difficult to describe the emotional impact, the crowd's joy, at having Robert Kubica win the race for Ferrari – the ultimate reward for his perseverance in the face of motorsport adversity. Seeing Polish flags waving in front of the podium and hearing the winning drivers singing the Italian national anthem along with thousands of fans was the highlight of the event. It compensated for the heartbreak of a Porsche fan watching his team come in second by 14 seconds, after starting last in class due to a penalty during qualifying.

It was an historic running of the 24 hours. Ferrari's third consecutive win, and by the non-factory team, the first Polish (Kubica) and Chinese (Ye) drivers to ever win Le Mans, and no rain (!) made for a thrilling ending to a special motorsports week.


If You Go...

### TICKETS

Tickets are available for purchase online in November. Members of the A.C.O (the club that runs the event) are able to purchase tickets before the general public. You can choose to attend the week's events, or just the race. But if you have a reserved seat, the ACO decides the actual seats to assign; you can only choose up to three of the seating areas as options. But be forewarned: This year, the tickets sold out to A.C.O. members within one day! So if you really want to go next year, join up early, and pounce on the website immediately

on ticket-release day. If you decide to go later, however, you might luck out by checking a tour company — Grand Prix Tours is one example — that might have unsold places. And because the separate tickets for sessions other than the race sell more slowly, you could add them to a place in a tour to see more of the event.

Another very important purchase is parking. Parking is at a premium for the weekend. Unless you want to walk miles (trust me, I know) you should try and purchase a parking pass. But if you have good walking boots and cushioned socks, you can save the hassle price of a rental car and parking by using the tram from downtown in Le Mans to the track.

If your plans change you can resell your tickets (or purchase others). But there is no 3rd party option (StubHub, etc) for this. All ticket sales must go thru the ACO website.

### **ACCOMMODATIONS**

As we learned, housing may be the first step in planning to attend. Many local accommodations are sold out before November (probably from the day after the previous race ends). Because we planned on a few day trips during our week, we widened our search to a 50 mile radius, and we were able to find a very nice apartment in a nearby small town. But if you don't want to rent a car, you will need to rent in or very near Le Mans itself. It is possible to fly into Paris and take a train to the station in Le Mans proper. But again, you will need to act early.

### LANGUAGE

Do not expect everyone to speak fluent English, or even intermediate English. In fact, by luck or chance we never encountered a fluent English speaker. For us this added to the atmosphere of the 24 Hours as truly being a French event. I had to adapt my 'point and shoot' technique to ordering from the concessionaires. But everyone was extremely polite, kind, and there were many mutual laughs over trying to communicate with each other.

### VENUE

The size of the Circuit de la Sarthe is difficult to comprehend. Don't expect to see the entire race. But you can choose different locations during the race to watch the cars. Just plan on walking a lot. There are some small shuttles run around the track by the organizers, but they can be hard to find – especially at night – and you will need to do some onsite research to make effective use of them.

As for food, merch, etc. the circuit is organized around different 'villages' with different food options and merchandisers. Food options ranged from baguettes with ham and butter (jambon beurre) to North Carolina BBQ (yes, really). Nearly all were delicious. **DV**

# **ON THE ROAD WITH A 911 CARRERA**, AND THE GHOSTS OF HOME

### THE CALL OF THE ROAD

In the spring of 2022, after a long winter, I needed to get out, hit the road. Wandering around and getting lost is one of my strongest skills, a road trip to old haunts would be perfect. My only companion would be my 2008 911 Carrera, a car as suited to the open road as any car could be.

Leaving the suburban clog of northern Virginia, I headed north on Route 15, through Maryland's rolling hills. By the time I reached Pennsylvania the architecture gave way to a distinctly Northeastern feel. Blocks of older homes converted to businesses and row houses built right on the street slid by.

I was heading toward the Finger Lakes region in Upstate New York. My first stop was the southern end of Seneca Lake. Watkins Glen, famous for its gorge, lake views, and motorsports legacy. A mecca for premier sports car racing ever since enthusiasts took to local public roads in 1948.

I've been visiting the track since the early '70s, even took my son to a Formula 1 race there in 1977 when he was five.

This time I stayed at the Seneca Lodge, a rustic, analog throwback nestled above town. Dinner was served by local high school and college kids. Check-in was done by hand. The bar, a trove of motorsport memorabilia and college pennants, was like stepping into a living museum. It was the perfect end to my first day on the road.

### **A TRIP BACK IN TIME**


The next morning, I took the back roads, bound for Scotia, a small town near Schenectady where I spent my high school years in the 1960s. I drove through Ithaca, the Carrera purring along perfectly, providing its own soundtrack. No need for the radio or CDs. Memories flooded back passing through towns with names like Schoharie and Herkimer,

Crossing over the Mohawk river, Scotia felt frozen in time. Familiar but alien at the same time. The art-house cinema, the bowling alley, the diner were all still there. I looked for an old girlfriend's house but couldn't find the street.

In many ways it was and still is "home." Fond memories like the huge event when the first Mustang was unveiled at the local Ford dealer. I visited my old school, walked familiar routes, had a burger and a Genny Cream Ale at The Village Tavern. The local hobby shop was a second home to me with slot car racing, models, and monthly car magazines about far-away places like Monte Carlo, Le Mans, Monza, and even Watkins Glen. Very heady stuff for a 13-year-old in northern New York.

Heading out of town, I followed a deeply personal route along Lake George, a stretch of road I'd traveled as a kid with my family. We'd day trip there, all seven of us crammed into my father's van. If you could last two minutes in the water, your whole body went numb the water was that cold.

Back then, I imagined myself driving that very road in a silver Porsche. And here I was, in a grey 911 with a black leather interior, on that same road. That was certainly a big checkmark on my all-time bucket list. Feeling chills and smiling like an idiot, it was one of life's special moments.

Plans changed suddenly with a call from my sister. Her husband had been hospitalized, and I headed straight to Massachusetts. Even though I've been transplanted to Virginia for 40 years, all my relatives still live there. I did what I could to help, keeping her company and running errands. No matter how long I extended my stay, however, I knew it would be temporary. It was good to see my sister surrounded with the love and help she and her husband needed.

As I left, I vowed not to let the return leg become a frantic dash. I took backroads through the Berkshires, Litchfield Hills, and Hudson River Valley. Familiar places. My wife and I had driven them together in years past. Lakeville, the Interlaken Inn, Lime Rock Park.

This Inn and the track held many memories for me; campaigning a race car with my boss, group caravans to attend races, and business events at the track. It felt good to pass through there one more time, especially on such a beautiful day.

Eventually, I landed in Monroe, NY, where I spent my early childhood. It looked different, more overgrown, smaller. I was glad I hadn't changed.

Pulling into my driveway, I felt that bittersweet end-ofjourney feeling. The trip had been more than I hoped. I wasn't looking for any deep truths on this trip but it did make me think about the concept of home.

Someone actually wrote that you can't go there again. For me, its where the heart is and I think you can go there anytime you want. Yes, it might look a bit different and the faces unfamiliar but that's too literal. To me, home is all the people and places where I lived that formed who I am now. # NÜRBURGRING 24 HOURS A FATHER-SON ADVENTURE

We decided to plan an epic motorsports trip to celebrate our son Ethan's high school graduaton. So, we planned our trip around watching him race at arguably one of the most challenging races in motorsports, on a circuit affectionately referred to as the "Green Hell".

We started the trip a week before the race so we could work in some other car related activities. We flew into Munich and rented a BMW Sportwagon to get around. We stayed one night in Munich walking distance to the Marienplatz where we enjoyed our first delicious German meal of many.

Next, we set off for Stuttgart-Zuffenhausen where we stayed walking distance to the Porsche Museum. That night, we had the best meal of the trip at Christophorus, Porsche's signature restaurant that is located in museum building. The next morning, we started activities by going to the nearby Mercedes-Benz Museum which hosts Classics & Coffee on Sundays from April 13 until October 12 in 2025! As we arrived, we very quickly figured out that there was a European meet of Lamborghini Countach, with cars coming from as far as the UK, Berlin and the Netherlands. Next stop was the Porsche Museum which lived up to our high expectations.

We joined Alex and his family on Tuesday afternoon to pick up our credentials and get the lay of the land. We had an early dinner at Pistenklause, which sits within the Nordschleife in the quaint town of Nurburg. It's connected to Am Tiergarten, which is a well known hotel owned by the Schmitz family of the famous Sabine Schmitz "Queen of the Ring".

After dinner Tuesday evening, we got a tour of some of the campgrounds that run the entire outside perimeter of 25 kilometer Nordschleife circuit. The Germans go all-in on their tailgating, setting up a full week before the race to secure their preferred spots trackside. Their rigs were really impressive, some of which were double decker trailers with generators, bier on tap, satellite feeds and big screen TVs. Many had fire pits, LED light shows and very loud music blaring. I asked Alex if he could hear the music from the racecar. He replied "absolutely...and they shoot fireworks and set off smoke clouds that make it onto the track". Crazy stuff!

After visiting a few camp sites and sharing a bier with some new friends, we got a rare opportunity to walk Nürburgring's world famous Caracciola Carousel!

On Wednesday, the race cars paraded through the nearby town of Adenau, ending in the town center with a rock concert. In the evening, Alex included us in his invitation to a private reception at the BMW M Power Showroom at the Nürburgring where they uveiled the new M2 CS Racing. Ethan and I spent Thursday exploring the Nürburgring area while Alex was at qualifying. We got to visit the Black Falcon pit box for an awesome behind the scenes experience. We also got to watch qualifying and races for a variety of classic car classes around the GP circuit. The sounds were intoxicating!

We started Friday with a friend from Arlington who currently lives in Berlin, Aaron Kobilis, joining us for race weekend. Classics racing resumed to include Tourenwagen Legends. Several Mercedes DTM cars proved to be among the fastest...and loudest!

Saturday...race day! We started the day touring the classics pits. It was so special to see these legendary racing machines up close while chatting with the racers. Next, we got to do the grid walk for the N24 and watch the formation lap from pit row. We watched the race until about 1:00 AM, leaving after Alex's night stint with his team in P3 in their class...SPI0. 
