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

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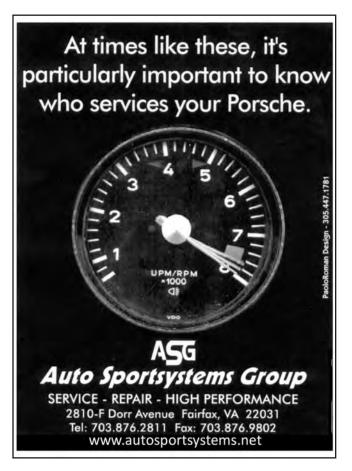


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THE Editor's Column

No Thanks to Sammy Hagar

In late January I drove my daughter to Philadelphia in her car – a several year old Korean SUV. As I have noted before, driving conditions have seemingly deteriorated during the COVID epidemic. By deteriorated I mean gotten dangerous. The posted limit continues to be a joke, not even any longer simply designed to permit ticketing, as there is virtually no highway police presence.

Truck drivers have further regressed to Smokey and the Bandit habits adding the new irritant (and danger) of horns rigged to sound like an approaching locomotive.

Drive the posted limit and you will be all but blown off the road - even if you stay in the right hand lane. Driving "at speed" now means 80 MPH at a minimum. It is not surprising that highway traffic deaths are up 18% nationally during a period when driving has been curtailed. When driving my Porsche, I have to consciously restrain the impulse to simply run away from the pack even knowing I am adding to the safety problem. In doing so, not only do I increase slightly the chances of a public safety encounter, I also hurt the image of Porsche drivers generally. As it played out, even in my daughter's car I found myself drifting toward 90MPH regularly. Given the "skills" of most American drivers this is not a good approach.

To get a regular driver's license in Germany you have to take a minimum of 14 theory classes and at least 12 driving lessons. Depending on how quickly you learn, it can be done in about three months. How many driving lessons you'll need depends on how quickly you learn; with 12 as the minimum and 50 on the high end, the full licensing course can cost USD \$1,500-\$2,500. In the US the requirements are: cue laughter track. Not to put too fine a point on it, the skills and knowledge necessary to get a driving license in the US are a joke and don't actually qualify drivers to safely operate a motor vehicle in the real world.

I don't have anything approaching a solution to this menace other than to drive like my life and that of my passengers really are at stake. As weather makes the turn and longer drives become more frequent, I am hoping that traffic conditions will improve as drivers "relearn" how to enjoy the journey and drive to survive. Stay safe out there! **DV**

When Ferry Porsche set out to build the ultimate sports car, it is doubtful that he intended it to be solely used during bumper-to-bumper commuting, although Porsches are quite adept at this. Let's be honest, these cars were made to be driven. Hard. But how does one safely do this in today's era of heavy traffic, speed cameras, and no autobahns?

Autocross is the safest and most affordable way to learn the limits of your car, and it's loads of fun! It's a timed competition, in which each car competes on the same course. Each course is uniquely designed for that day and everyone has the same period of time to learn the course: the major elements and the nuances. Typically, a run takes around a minute as you navigate a hundred cones setup in a large parking lot to create the track du jour.

For those of you who have never driven an autocross, it may seem a little intimidating; yet getting started is actually quite easy. You can learn the ropes by attending our autocross school or simply register for a normal season event. We have experienced driving coaches available free of charge and there are always friendly people around, so don't be shy to ask for help if you're unsure of what to do.

Autocross is straightforward to learn, especially with the help of our experienced driving coaches, and can take a lifetime to master, which is why many of our members participate year after year. Here at PCA Potomac, our events go beyond just the racing. We are a welcoming social group that has

just as much fun off the course as on. We look forward to chatting with you during and after the event to get to know you better.

Registering early on motorsportreg.com is always a good idea as events often fill up, and registration is now open for all PCA members! Simply search "PCA Potomac Autocross" and you should find our events with ease, or you can email autocross@pcapotomac.org if you have any issues and we'll be happy to assist.

New for the 2022 season, as COVID shifts to a more endemic state, we are reinstating our loaner helmet program, in-car instruction, and complimentary breakfast, which we have suspended in 2020 and most of 2021 due to the pandemic. Also, after the tremendous success PCA Potomac had with our Women's HPDC last year, we want to give a special shout out to all our female readers, encouraging you to consider signing up for our Autocross School this year, held on April 23rd. PCA Potomac hosts a club race every year; this year's race weekend is September 16th to 18th. The race is at Summit Point Motorsports Park and is part of the PCA National Club Racing Program – a series of 25 races held at racetracks across North America. Individual regions provide the local infrastructure to conduct the race weekend, and the National Club Racing Committee provides the rules, standard operating procedures, and key officials for the race. Our event attracts between 130-150 racers each year, and about 30% of these are from the Potomac Region. Racers must meet the national licensing requirements and prepare a Porsche race car in accordance with the rules; see https://pcaclubracing.org/rules/ for more information if you are interested in becoming a PCA club racer.

A great way to experience the race weekend is to volunteer to help; it takes over 100 volunteers to handle registration, welcome participants and guests, grid cars, flag at corner stations, set up happy hours and dinners, manage traffic in the paddock, timing & scoring, and help with tech inspection and scales. If you'd like to enjoy the camaraderie of a great group of folks while seeing some incredible cars and great racing, look for volunteer registration to open in July. No experience is needed for many positions and we're always happy to train newcomers. PCA Potomac strives to give back through both Community Service activities and Charitable Giving. We work in several ways to benefit those less fortunate. Life for some in the DC metro area is marked by a perpetual need for food, shelter, and clothing. In DC alone, there are approximately 4,000 homeless individuals, which is approximately the same number as our Potomac membership. In the face of this stark reality, we encourage our members to join us to make a difference. This year, we will conduct food drives, warm coat drives, and a toy drive at our annual Holiday Party.

Additionally, we remain committed to our mutually enriching partnership with the Erin Levitas Foundation (ELF) for the prevention of sexual assault. We are already collecting items for the Charity Auction in September, so reach out if you have something to donate!

We also kicked off our 2022 Public Service effort by partnering with the Marshall Legacy Institute. This organization trains and deploys land mine detecting dogs worldwide so that communities in war torn countries can resume a safe existence. Another addition is that participants in the Track Heros program, designed to assist Vets and First Responders manage PTSD, will attend our PorscheFest DE.

Last year, over 5,000 American teenagers died in motor vehicle crashes. To reduce this number, the Tire Rack Street Survival program, a non-profit, national

driver education program was developed to teach teens the skills they need to stay alive behind the wheel. Our Potomac region was honored to host a Tire Rack Street Survival event at Summit Point in 2021, and we will repeat this successful event in 2022.



If your interest is tweaked or your need for speed is calling you, follow the link to MSR where you can see your options and sign up for events. For those just starting, the HPDC's fill up quickly as do the instructed beginning groups for our DE's, so sign up early for best chance of entry into the event. Our club requires beginning drivers to have been to a HPDC or a similar program or to have experience with multiple autocrosses to meet the threshold for enrollment into our DE's, so if you are interested, sign up for one of the clinics. If you are a DE regular, you too should sign up early for events.

We look forward to seeing you this season. Remember, our goal is to "be safe, have fun, and learn something".



AUTOCROSS: AN EXCITING SPORT FOR EVERYONE, ESPECIALLY US GALS!

Calling all ladies who are looking to break out their inner adventurous spirit! COVID lockdown have you looking to get out and have some FUN? Are you a closet adrenaline junkie who needs a fix? Well, have no fear – I've got your back! Come join us at one of our PCA Potomac Autocross (cool people just write it as AX) events. For information on what autocross is, check out Jeff Braun's article in this issue, which will give you a great AX overview. If Danica Patrick can drive IndyCar with the boys, if Sabine Schmitz can win the grueling 24 Hours of Nurburgring and drive on the Porsche and BMW teams with the boys, then you too can be an Autocross heroine.

I just finished up my 'rookie' season of Autocross and, first and foremost, it was a BLAST for a ton of reasons! I like a good adventure, but I have to confess that at first I may have been just a little bit intimidated. But, when I arrived at my first AX event, I was immediately put at ease because everyone was inviting, friendly and helpful. When I registered, I requested an instructor since I was new to the sport and was fortunate to have Tessa H assigned to me. She was great, coaching me through the basics as well as giving me the 'big picture'. By the way, Tessa is one of the best drivers and is a great speed queen role model. After the first event, I was hooked and went to eight more AX events (including the school), and signed up for an instructor every time. I learned a great deal from each instructor - they all were excellent drivers and I took away something different from each one. With their help, I went from a total novice to a driver who could get around the course pretty respectably.

So, if you are thinking of jumping in, I recommend that you attend the AX school. It is a day jam-packed with fun, is well organized, and is done in a relaxed environment. You will learn AX core skills and fundamentals – such as trail braking,

navigating slaloms, understeer/oversteer, and throttle steering – and have plenty of time on the course behind the wheel to really find your groove. A side benefit that I became exceptionally proficient was running over the cones and becoming a certified 'cone-killer' (admittedly I find that to be half the fun).

After a season of AX, I can tell that I am a much better driver. I have greater confidence behind the wheel, understand the performance limits of my car, and am much more familiar with my car overall (I can finally answer the question 'what does traction control really do?'). All of my new AX skills are fully transferable to my road driving, though thankfully I have not been in a situation where I have had to use them!

AX is especially safe, too. You wear helmets when you are driving, but I am convinced that is really just because the boys think it makes them look cooler. The 'worst' thing that happened to me was doing a 360 degree spin. Spinning your car is just another learning experience, and I learned fairly quickly how to counter-steer and manage the throttle (gas pedal) to avoid doing that (even though it actually is pretty fun).

You can be as competitive as you want to be or just go out and drive and have fun. It is satisfying to watch your times drop throughout your runs so you can see the results of your improved driving skills. After just a few runs, I was already shaving many seconds off my time!

If you are ready to kick it into high gear, sign up for the AX school on April 23rd at Summit Point Motorsports Park, located just across the West Virginia state line about 75 minutes west of Tysons Corner. It is guaranteed to be a 'Fast and Furious', high-octane day of fun and camaraderie. And, you will come home with a wacky, googly-eyed cone 'trophy' that you can display with pride in the background of your Zoom calls.

Attend any Potomac HPDE or Club Race event and you'll observe a multitude of personalities that contribute to an atmosphere of fun, energy and passion for the sport. You'll also see a camaraderie of help and encouragement throughout the paddock. Browse through post-event photos and, at the crossroad of these traits, is a charismatic smiling face that catches your eye: that of Kenny Kong.

Kenny is a relatively new Potomac member, joining PCA in 1 year BC (Before Covid), aka 2019. His current Porsche string includes a 2014 911 Turbo that he tracks, and a Cayenne that cossets his family day-to-day, as well as being a capable towing tool for the 911.

Kenny grew up in Chicago, moving to Potomac, Maryland, in 2004. He married Esther, and they have two young boys, Mason (5) and Jordan (1).

It's easy to assume that every 911 Turbo owner worships the straights, but Kenny's favorite part of Summit Point Main is the carousel sequence from turns 6 through 9. The flow, balance and precision required to get this section right, he explains, motivates his every lap.

Executive Kenny works at a software tech company on clinical IT modernization and digital identities. While working mainly from home during Covid, his role as a technology evangelist includes speaking at conferences to promote new technologies.

Kenny always plays at 100%. It doesn't matter if it's work, driving, cooking, or having some fun Dad-time with his boys, his unconditional energy and enthusiasm is infectious. He loves to play golf, smoke cigars from his significant collection, and consume vast quantities of prime rib without putting a micron on his waistline. For many of us, the latter is very annoying.

Kenny's contribution to the club includes volunteering as a Club Race Grid Marshal, manning the Driver Registration desk at track events, and acting as Mr. Motivator in the paddock. The return on his investment in the club, he says, is being part of an awesome community of fun people that share a common passion in great sportscars and driving them as they were intended to be! **DV**

Vintage Rally Adventure #7 Veterans vs Rookies

In 2017 Craig and I did our first Vintage Rally, the 25th Anniversary of the "New England 1000". WE. WERE. HOOKED! Including this most recent one, we have done three in New England, three in Virginia/West Virginia, and one in Texas hill country. They've all been different, and all spectacular driving experiences.

Our hosts, Jean and Rich Taylor, have staged over 100 of these rallies around the country. Every one includes grand hotels; all your meals; luggage transportation; and a swag bag with coats, shirts, hats for both driver and navigator, and rags and cleaners to keep the car looking its best too. They have assistants – "Wranglers" – who help with all the logistics of moving such a large entourage from place to place, including mechanics who hopefully can fix whatever it is you're driving if it breaks down. If they can't, there are five Miatas available to drive so you can continue on the rally. Over the years the Taylor's have donated over S2 million to various charities, all thanks to these very special events.

Technically, Vintage means 25 years or older. These rallies also allow Exotics, which is where Porsche falls in. Out of 42

cars on this trip, 19 were Porsches. There were Jags, Ferraris, Aston Martins, two McLarens, two Alfas, a couple Corvettes and a 2019 Morgan V-6. Teams came from 20 different states. There was also a father-son team from Puerto Rico; the 17-year old son is currently in The Road to Indy program for aspiring race car drivers. And besides us (Veterans), there were two other teams from PCA Potomac – Veterans John and Carol Evans on their third Vintage Rally, and Tony and Cindy Pagonis on their first (Rookies).

The rally is approximately 1000 miles, driven over four days. Each day's drive is comprised of 4-5 stages, some timed, some used as "transit legs" to get us to a special destination. This could be a museum, a car collection, a track, or even a restoration garage. We've been to deserted towns of the Old West (Texas), motorcycle museums, and the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Green Bank, WV. The timed stages are set up as a modified TSD format. Each team is given an "Out" time, mileage and driving time. The goal is to cross the "In" checkpoint PRECISELY on your due in arrival time. Points are accrued for every SECOND you're either late or early, with a maximum penalty of 500 per stage. So, if you're more than 8 minutes late, no further need to rush. ZERO means you nailed it perfectly. In five of our previous six rallies we aced a perfect score for the week. The only time we did not have a perfect score involved NY State police, but that's a story for another time.

Day One started at The Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV. The morning had two timed stages ending at a collection called Duncan Imports. This turned out to be three massive warehouses filled mostly with JDMs – Japanese Domestic Market cars. These are micro cars – max 660cc engines, 63 hp, and 134 inch overall length. This location housed roughly 1300 cars of the collection. We did not visit the other location in Christiansburg, VA with another 1400 of these minis. It was incredible. From there we had a short transit leg to the campus of Virginia Tech (Go Hokies!) for lunch, and then another timed leg after lunch to the Glade Springs Resort, our home base for the next two nights. However, an afternoon encounter with local traffic cost us dearly – one minute late to check in! 60 points. Total miles today 233.

Every day we look forward to dinner to hear about everyone else's experiences of the day. A father/son team driving a 1984 Ferrari 308 GTB became the entertainment for the week. On day one they had an "almost" devastating encounter with a logging truck going around a corner on a road that it shouldn't have been on. Fortunately, they saw the truck just in time, and instead of going UNDER the truck they slid off the road! No damage, but enough of a delay to make them miss their check-in time.

Day Two consisted of four stages, two timed in the morning, ending for lunch at a place called Smokey's, which overlooked the spectacular New River Gorge. No collections on this day, but we did pass working coal mines and huge coal chutes. The roads were challenging and the scenery was beautiful. The leaves were just beginning to turn, and the colors only got more vibrant as the week went on. Total miles for the day was a mere 205 in a huge circle.

The Ferrari story of the day was a tale of how they missed a turn and got lost after lunch, and after circling around found themselves back at the restaurant. Trying to figure out what

went wrong, they discovered that the navigator (Father? Son?) was reading the wrong page of directions! Once that was resolved and they got back on track, all was well. But they added an additional 75 miles to their day!

Day Three was a bit more eventful. The first stage was supposed to end at an Arby's parking lot, but they wouldn't let the organizers set up so everyone got a Zero for the leg. From there we had a transit leg to the birthplace of author Pearl Buck. It was closed so teams had to proceed to the next checkpoint. But because the wranglers who were at the checkpoint at Arby's were counting on us being at Pearl Buck's for an hour, they didn't have time to hopscotch over us and get to the next checkpoint first. Since the rally cars got there first, everyone got another Zero!

The afternoon had one more timed stage, driving through the cell phone dead zone, aka the US National Radio Quiet Zone in Green Bank WV, and ending at the General Store in Cass. It's a genuine throwback to simpler times, with an old-fashioned ice cream counter inside and a steam engine locomotive outside. From there we had another 10-mile transit leg to Allegheny Springs, a resort at Snowshoe, WV and our hotel for the night.

One of the important things to do on a Vintage Rally is fill the gas tank before reaching the hotel. The first leg of the day is always timed, and the last leg isn't, so you need to be ready to go after breakfast. After the Cass General Store we figured we'd hit a gas station near the hotel, but there wasn't

one! Once we got to the top of the mountain, we had to head back down to find gas. Closest station was almost 7 miles away! We got there on fumes. Total miles today 270, plus an additional 14 on the gas run. One day to go.

The weather on the top of Snowshoe was pretty gray with showers predicted. A Ferrari had an issue with the driver's window not closing all the way, so to protect the inside they covered the gap with yellow duct tape! Very creative.

Day Four began at the top of the mountain completely fogged in, but we persevered. Two timed stages in the morning, including the longest one yet of 100 miles. We ended at The Dairy Barn for lunch, literally in the loft of the barn. The last timed leg of the week was after lunch, taking us to the general store in Paint Bank, VA, which bills itself as 9 miles from the end of the Earth. There's only one road there, the notorious 311. If you make it there, they say you've "Survived the 311". Indeed. The Ferrari team enjoyed the drive so much when they got to the end of 311 they turned around and went back down the mountain so they could switch drivers and both experience the fun!

The last stop of interest was at Greenbrier Classic Cars. This is a huge collection, including multiple 1960s and 70s Corvettes, Lincoln Town Cars, and Jaguars and even a 1987 Red RUF 911, on sale for a mere S245,000. Everything was for sale, and a few of the collectors on the rally are in active negotiations for new vehicles. Total miles today 293. At the awards banquet on the final night we learned of some of the other "amusing" adventures of the week. There was the 1966 Ferrari 330 GTC whose water hose broke 20 feet from the finish line at the last check point. The car filled with smoke, and because we've learned that older Ferraris have window problems, he couldn't clear the air. So the driver jumped out of the car and ran across the finish line to meet his time (yes, he made it!).

Then there was the team in a 1962 Porsche 356B Roadster. The husband needed a cane to walk. His wife needed the cane to help him keep his foot on the clutch...now that's teamwork! And there was the 1993 Porsche 91I RS America with a broken clutch. The team had to drive a Miata all week and couldn't rave enough about how much fun it was. We also met a doctor who operated alongside Dr. Frederick Simeone, founder of the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum in Philadelphia.

So how did all the PCA Potomac teams do? John and Carol Evans got an award for First to the Pole, EVERY DAY! They take pride in being the first car out, but another team wanted that honor one day so they parked their car at the cones marking the Out checkpoint for the next morning. Much to their surprise, when they came out the cones had been moved one car length forward and John and Carol were in front waiting to go! Overall for the week they zeroed every stage except one. A navigator error (since they both drive we don't know who was responsible) caused a catastrophic leg of maximum 500 points.

In the thirty years that Vintage Rally has been operating, every rally has had at least one car with a perfect score of Zero. This was the first time in their history that this didn't happen. The winning score was 60, achieved by two teams – us and Tony and Cindy Pagonis! Now they're hooked too!

It was a great week, and we anxiously await our 8th Vintage Rally next May, the 30th Anniversary of the New England 1000. \mathbb{N}



We print and distribute around 3,000 Der Vorgänger magazines each month to a readership of over 4,000. Most are delivered locally, while a few are sent overseas. DV is an important resource for members and we try hard to get a quality product in your hands at the beginning of every month. To that end, we decided during 2021 to move our printing to a more local commercial printer.

To help identify and plan the transition, we turned to Potomac member and DE participant, Michael Brady. Michael suggested Winchester Printers Inc., a family-owned business in Virginia that has been printing since 1892. Chris Hottle of Winchester Printers, Inc. explained, "We may live in a more digital world, but our experience says, print isn't going away anytime soon!"

Having seen what they could do, and the way they wanted to work with us, we decided to print all 2022 magazines at Winchester Printers .

The transition started at the end of November 2021 with test prints and discussion with Debbie Wilson at Winchester Printers (WP) about our 60th Anniversary Edition for January. Two issues later, we can now upload the design files each month, and have confidence that WP will print, bind, crop, label and post our magazines to us all. We are still learning and improving the design through to print process, but are pleased already with the quality of product and support.
